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change that after you have had three chances on General File you get a fourth chance by moving to reconsider. And after you have two chances on Select File, which basically kills the bill, if you can't advance it after three times on General and after two times on Select, that bill is dead, then you reconsider. That is fine. That gives you one last shot at getting a bill across, but there is no sense to having reconsideration prior to that, so this makes it clear that that is the process and procedure we ought to follow. Now if you would argue, well then how are you going to bring a bill up, it fails on the first shot and gee whiz I want to get it up again. There are other ways to do that than reconsideration and that way is to get the Speaker to put it up on the agenda, to special order it or just to bring it up quicker than maybe you would otherwise have it, working with the Speaker and putting it back on the agenda because you have two more shots at that bill. So it seems to me that you don't need reconsideration to get the bill up again, you just need another chance as you have because you get three chances on General File to get a bill across to bring that bill up. So that would work fine if you want to do it that way. What happens though is some people on some bills dominate things until it gets so many chances to come up, reconsideration after reconsideration after vote after vote, it precludes a chance for many other bills to be heard because of the time it takes to do all that. So we are saying let's streamline the process, you get one, two, three shots on General File, then you can move for reconsideration if you can't get it up by that time, and then one, two shots on Select File and then if you can't get it up, then you get reconsideration again. I think it would help the process and make it much clearer what reconsideration is all about. That is why the rule change is being proposed and why the rule change is being supported by the Rules Committee.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, the Chair has one, two, three, four, five lights on. Senator Kahle, Senator Marsh, Senator Warner, Senator Haberman, Senator Beutler. The Chair now recognizes Senator Kahle and we are still referring to item number one of the Rules Committee recommendations. Senator Kahle.

SENATOR KAHLE: Mr. Speaker and members, I guess after some discussion in the committee, I now support this rules change but one thing you want to remember is I think a person in the early parts of the session would have a much better chance of getting a bill passed under this rule than he would later in the session because sometimes when we run out of time we do ask that a bill be brought up for
