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much reliance upon staff and not enough reliance upon ourselves and all of us are very proud of hiring very capable staff. But we need to be in a position to be sure, absolutely certain and positive that the decisions and the votes that are cast on this floor are our own decisions and not the representations of staff people. In reference to the cloture motion, I think that if we continue to try to emphasize the importance of cutting off debate, and I don't like to hear the word "the tyranny of the minority" because I don't really think that applies although looking at Senator Newell, we seemed to have a meeting of the minds there for a little while and I think that we could recognize that. There are those of us in here who are going to disagree very vividly and vigorously on issues but I don't think that very often that any one of us wants to deny the other person the opportunity to use everything that they can to call attention to the situation as they see it. There is another thing that I think we need to consider and that is the fact that we are a one house Legislature. We do not have the luxury of a second house which might reconsider our action that is taken on this floor and, therefore, because of that we need to consider deeply and seriously every single issue. I am concerned. I share Senator Beutler's concern with the necessity for the management of time but I would suggest that if we would keep a stopwatch upon the bills, you will find that the so called "trash" bills or noncontroversial bills on this floor will always use up more time than will many of the important bills. I give you for example the appropriations bills of the last session which rambled through this body in one afternoon like a freight train going downhill and I defy any member of this body with the exception of those members of the Appropriations Committee to explain fully and thoroughly what was in those bills but they moved. It is the quality, Senator Warner. But the point I want to make is this. If you are going to spend time based upon the importance of the various bills, there are a number of bills of mine that I am sure will be allowed a very small amount of time and some others that might need more but in the past few years we have had a tendency to act upon the so-called noncontroversial bills first and we spend a lot of time on them even though we would never invoke cloture on those bills and then we rush through the major bills in a short period of time and that sometimes it is easy then for one of us to perhaps do something or perhaps pass a bill which is not fully explained. So I would hate very much to see a rule of cloture invoked. I don't think it is necessary. I think that with almost with less time involved we have other methods at our disposal and the rule of cloture will actually never be helpful to us except from the standpoint of publicity. We are again going to tell the public we have adopted a cloture rule which is going to better manage our time. It is not
