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stop responding to every whim that a newspaper editor may indulge in writing an editorial or directing the news in terms of saying certain items are more important than others, therefore more space will be given to these items and one thing we decide we're going to criticize at this newspaper says the editor is the fact that the Legislature will not limit itself in debate. How many times have you seen newspaper articles and editorials criticize the Legislature for dealing in trivia but open that same newspaper and the vast majority of it is given to trivia. When the television editorials are given, watch television for twelve hours and the vast majority of that is not only is trivia but it is insane. Listen to the radio which will give an editorial in opposition to the Legislature and most of what they give is trivia and nonsense. So the Legislature is going to have to adopt for itself an attitude about itself and then select rules which will facilitate the operations of the Legislature but not cripple it. If we did reach a turn where the vast majority felt that there was obstructionism strictly for the purpose of obstructionism, then a vote could be taken at that time to institute whatever was necessary to get past that rough spot. But to envision or postulate an unusual circumstance and adopt a rule for that particular circumstance which is going to cover all activities of the Legislature, I think is a mistake. So I am opposed to this rule change and I hope that enough of you will vote against it so that as intelligent as Senator Beutler is he will be frustrated in this effort. And one other thing I have to say, as I look to my immediate right, look to my immediate left and look in the mirror, based on the intelligence quotient in this row I have to call this the brains for us now.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Rumery.

SENATOR RUMERY: Mr. President, I would like to call the question.

SENATOR CLARK: That won't be necessary. We don't have any more lights on. The question before the House is the adoption of rule #7. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record the vote. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BUETLER: Now, Mr. Speaker, I would like to have a Call of the House and a roll call vote please.

SENATOR CLARK: A Call of the House has been requested. All those in favor of a Call of the House will vote aye, opposed vote nay. Record the vote.
