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So if we want to limit ourselves on how many bills we can introduce, then why shouldn't the Governor be limited? It seems to me that we are making an exception that is not necessary. The Constitution does call for the ability of the Governor to introduce budget bills and we still would provide for that. He could introduce the bill through the Appropriations Committee and that would be no problem. Similarly if he had a bill ready by the first ten days of session he could have the Speaker again introduce the bill in his behalf. It does not hurt that constitutional mandate that we have but at the same time realizes that we give too much authority away constantly. In the special session we did that, remember? We all agreed that we could have only bills introduced on the request of the Governor instead of ourselves. We could not introduce our own bills in the special session. I fought that at that time again, because of my concern for the legislative branch of government and the fact that we should not close off options to ourselves, that we allow the executive branch to pursue. I think it would be wrong as legislators to not limit the Governor as we limit ourselves and I would ask your rejection of the amendment by Senator Lamb.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Haberman, do you want to talk on the amendment?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Yes, Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I feel the amendment is a good amendment for this reason. In case of an emergency, and it could happen, the Governor would have to introduce a bill. Now we don't know what they are going to do in Washington all the time. They could take some action in Washington that would cause him to have to introduce a bill. If we have used up our limits and if we can't introduce a bill to take care of the emergency or to take care of this action, then the Governor can. I don't think that he is going to use this power to build a kingdom. I don't think he is going to violate this power that we are supposedly giving him but I think that we should have some means, we should have some means that in case of that emergency that he can introduce a bill so I would support the amendment.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Warner, do you want to talk on the amendment?

SENATOR WARNER: Well, I am only going to speak once. My comments are to the amendment as well as to the rule as a whole. I think...

SENATOR CLAPK: We are talking on the amendment only now.
