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the problem in this manner, you really just drive it underground and there is no way that the people are served. There is no way the Legislature is served and there certainly isn't...it is not a method by which you expedite the work of this Legislature. Once again, if you want to put the issue, if you want to start combining issues and we have done that in the past, I'm not saying if the subjects are germane but frequently the purpose of good legislation is better served by drawing a single bill so that a single one issue is out there in the open. It is not hidden and we know what we are talking about. If you come in here with a bill which has many topics or many subjects even though they're all germane and you are going to find out that something slipped by that you weren't aware of. So I would hope you would defeat the amendment, not because I disagree with the amendment, Senator Wesely, but because I disagree heartily with the rule and I think we should then defeat the rule.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Nichol.

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, again I rise to oppose an amendment. I'm kind of between the rock and the dog. I don't know whether to oppose or support this amendment because I think it solves the problem for me. Perhaps I might be cosigned on too many bills and it would let me out of the fence that Senator Schmit was talking about. But I don't think that, Senator Wesely, you are going to corral us no matter what you come in way of amendments but to me your amendment is not clear. I haven't seen it written and I don't know exactly what it will do but I think it attempts to appease some of us that aren't willing to change horses in the middle of the stream and whether your amendment passes or not I am still against the proposed rule change. So I don't care what you do with this amendment but I am opposed to it.

SENATOR CLARK: I don't have anyone else that wants to talk on the amendment. If you do hold your hand up. Senator Newell. All right, keep your hand down then. Senator Wesely, did you want to close.

SENATOR WESELY: Yes, I'll just explain again. All it says is that to clarify what was the intent. The intent is this. You limit how many bills you can introduce, the bills that you have your name on up there, that is going to count against your bill limit, eight, fifteen or whatever. After the bill is in the purpose has been served in limiting how many bills you can introduce. The bill is already there. If you want to add your name as a cosponsor you go to the
