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a couple of examples. You remember the two major labor bills, the one on the labor side last year and the one on the other side, business side? Both of them failed on Final. Both of them had to be...or they had to be revived and we had to get 30 votes when we finally got an agreement reached. The accountability bill...I can go on one after another. A bill failed on Final because there weren't enough votes or because a final resolution hadn't been reached. You changed it to make it 30 votes to revive it. I am simply saying consistency on reconsideration should require 25. Rest assured, Senator Lamb, I can live with whatever you put out there, 25 or 30, but it should seem to me a majority of the body after they have processed a bill all the way across should be allowed to pass it on Final. That is all I am saying.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I wonder if my colleague, Senator DeCamp, would yield to a question.

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp, will you respond?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Sure.

SENATOR CULLAN: Senator DeCamp, as I understand...I didn't... I don't have a copy of your rule change on my desk either, and I wonder if you would just reiterate what you are attempting to do irrespective of one issue or another, just tell us what the rule change is, please.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Yes, because everybody always sees sinister plots in here. At the present time if a bill fails on Final Reading a reconsideration requires 30 votes to make the bill alive again or to have another vote on it. If the bill fails at any other time, a reconsideration requires 25 votes. It requires 25 votes to pass the bill in the first place which is a majority of the Legislature. I am simply saying the 30 is first of all inconsistent and second of all I am suggesting it is unreasonable and that the amount to reconsider should be 25 which is a majority of the Legislature. That is all.

SENATOR CULLAN: Okay, thank you, Senator DeCamp. Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I would join Senator Wesely and Senator Lamb in opposing Senator DeCamp's rule change. I think that if we would support Senator DeCamp's rule change, we would encourage many, many votes on Final Reading, every bill would have many, many chances and
