

SENATOR SIECK: Mr. President and members of the body, this word "definitely" really bothers me. I see the Upper Blue Natural Resource District where we have a control area. If we're going to say "definitely", that means that we are going to take water out of some area of the state to put in this area so that we can control it definitely and I just can't see how we can do this. It is a scary word and I think we'd better leave it as it is. We must realize that we have to be conscious of the fact that we could run out of water and that we're saying that we are going to definitely keep that water there forever. It is something that we just honestly can't say because it is not going to happen unless we're going to get some water from some other areas of the state and put into the water short areas. Are we going to ask those people to shut their wells off? I don't think we can do this. I just don't think we can do this. So I am not going to support this amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Lamb, did you want to talk on the Vickers amendment? Senator Haberman, did you want to talk on the Vickers amendment?

SENATOR HABERMAN: I would rather raise a point of order, Mr. Speaker.

SENATOR CLARK: All right, what is the point of order? State your point.

SENATOR HABERMAN: My point is, I went up to Pat to ask for a copy of the amendments so I could come back and look at my white copy and find out just exactly what the amendment said and I misunderstood and was told a copy had been passed out. A copy has not been passed out and Pat only has one copy and I don't blame him for not letting loose of that copy. So I would like to ask you, Mr. President, to rule that beings as we split this issue and as important as the issue is and as many of amendments that there are and as detailed as Senator Vickers seems to be that we have copies of these amendments, there is no problem to sending somebody down to the copy machine and have them copied and passed out, so those of us who are interested enough can sit down and change the bill and see what is going on. That is my point of order, Mr. President. Thank you.

SENATOR CLARK: Your point is well taken. Senator Vickers.
