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which is addressed to me because I am a Senator which doesn't guarantee that there will be alcohol there. Senators will discuss issues related to alcohol while perhaps imbibing, so it is very difficult to take a substance which is sanctified and made acceptable and even a necessity and try to make people feel all of a sudden in one area of their life there is something wrong with it. What I am saying is that you are going to have to deal with peoples' attitudes toward this substance, and if that is not done, you can build more jails because that is what you will have to do and just lock everybody up and throw away the key, and that way those people who have been locked up certainly will never drive after drinking again. But you are going to have to build more jails because others are going to do the same thing. So this approach that you are taking I guarantee you will not accomplish anything. It will not make a dent in the problem. It is not going to touch the thing that people are talking about and that concerns them. Nobody who is trying to look for what has been termed a "quick fix" is going to accept the notion that some things have to start in the home, in the church and in the schools....

SENATOR CLARK: You have one minute, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS:that you have to start getting to the minds of young people and turn them in the direction you would like them to go with reference to this substance. But if they see it being accepted everywhere, I don't see any chance that you have of solving this problem of driving and drinking with what you are doing now. So I hope this is the last word that I say on it, but I am not going to vote for any of these amendments. I am not going to vote for the bill. The only reason I didn't vote against it in the Judiciary Committee is because they said they wanted to get something out here. Well, the something is out here and I view it as a monstrosity and there is only one fate which is suitable for a monster and that is to dispatch it as swiftly as possible.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Haberman, do you wish to close?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, I will ask for a Call of the House.

SENATOR CLARK: A Call of the House has been requested. All those in favor will vote aye, opposed vote nay. Record the vote.

CLERK: 11 ayes, 0 nays to go under Call, Mr. President.
