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or any of the other foundations who might be interested in this particular area.

SENATOR WESELY: That is an excellent question, Senator Peterson. I would like to respond to that, and I am sorry I forgot to mention that in my opening. We have checked this out and we have decided...well, we asked, have you gotten private monies? Can we get private monies? And what they tell me is a lot of the money that has made the museum as great as it is now is private, the Cooper Foundation and other foundations, they have supported the museum. And we went back to them and we asked them, would you support this renovation? And they said to us, that is not the sort of thing foundations support. We will support if you want to put in a new exhibit or renovate some of the materials that you have for a new opening or something, but as far as putting in air conditioning, that is something that doesn't appeal to them. So what we have worked out basically is this, that if the state is willing to support the museum and to protect what they have got, we think we can get a lot of foundation support for further improvements to the museum and I am talking about some of these foundations you are mentioning. But they don't want to support air conditioning and fundamental things they think the state ought to take care of, and those that gave in the past gave us hundreds and thousands of dollars are made at us because we haven't taken care of what they already gave, so we are kind of in trouble with the foundations right now with the museum.

SENATOR H. PETERSON: Well, I would just guess from my own experience that if an appeal were made to Peter Kiewitt Foundation in person by Warner that we would find they would accept the challenge and probably would come to the rescue of Morrill Hall. I know the original Morrill family real well at Stromsburg that gave much of the money for this and it just seems to me that since that is the historical background that we ought to really try that manner before we start asking for state funds for this purpose. That is my point, and I just really think we are making a mistake not using the Peter Kiewitt Foundation that has to spend their money. They have got to get rid of that money from the federal ruling standpoint and I just think we are making a mistake not going to them.
