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but probably will not be advanced.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes S nator Dworak.

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. President and colleagues, I thought it was rather interesting listening to the arguments. not so much the issue itself but the arguments we have given on the issue. The responsibility of this particular building and of these archives rest with this body not with Peter Kiewitt, not with the Regents. The responsibility is here and we can't pass the buck on. Now, it is a tight year. I would be the first to admit that and I think you can make a decision on availability of funds as to whether we are going to perpetuate essential state services and certainly this is one of those type of services. Certainly this is something that is irreplaceable. Certainly this is something that is probably without a name value. But to sit here in this body and say, hey, I hope some private foundation comes in and bails us out, you know, there is no free lunch...there is absolutely no free lunch. We can't look for somebody else to take over our legitimate role, our legitimate responsibility, that's ours. So when we cast a vote, I think it is very proper to cast the vote based on availability of funds, based on priorities, based something else. But sit up here and try to duck this issue and to say, hey, maybe somebody from the outside will come in and take care of what is legitimately and rightly ours to do, to say that, hey, let's let the Board of Regents take the responsibility for this and think that we are absolving our own responsibility, we are kidding ourselves. The buck is here. The buck stops here, and how we vote on this particular issue, then we go back to our constituents, then we stand to the generations to come and answer to them as to whether this is preserved or not preserved and the reasons may be very legitimate. But to try to weasel out of this, to try to say that, hey, somebody else should do this, that is unacceptable.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Chambers. We have a motion on the desk.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman, it deals with personal privilege.

SENATOR CLARK: State your point.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: First of all, I want everybody to know the rule that I am dealing with. It is Rule 2, Section 11, and it says personal privilege shall be first, those
