these savings in the wrong place. Senator Fenger asks us to be prudent and to be honest men and women in this affair. We are going to be prudent, we are going to be honest. I think what we need to do is compare the state employees with their salaries and benefits to all the states that are contiguous to Nebraska. This would not be putting our head in the sand but be lifting it out and staring at the facts when it comes to this issue. facts say that Nebraska is lowest among those contiguous states. As far as belt tightening by both rural and urban citizens, the state employees have been tightening their belts for a long time. Their position is not unlike other public servants and it has been a historic problem. Governor has probably done a very good job in melting down the employee force of the state employees already rendering the state numerous dollars in savings. Fourteen hundred state employees have lost their jobs in the name of savings and that may be fine and well, but to go after this group with a zero percent raise is uncalled for. When the citizens of Nebraska think about their state employees, I hope that they hope as I do that these employees are talented, that they represent quality people. But if we continue along the road that we are going not recognizing their economic needs, but even worse cutting back on their real wages, I am afraid that we are going to have to give up those job requisites of having quality and being talented people. I would like to remind this body and I would like to remind the state also that not only has there been a cutback in the work force but many of the state employees have assumed responsibilities that have gone beyond their historic forty to fifty hour work week routines. We need to think about the sacrifice that they are already making in the name of saving the state's taxpayers' monies. guess I have nothing further to say, Mr. Chairman. Thank you.
