SENATOR LAMB: All those who want to have a Call of the House vote yes, those opposed vote no.

CLERK: 13 ayes, 4 nays to go under Call, Mr. President.

SENATOR LAMB: The House is under Call. Please record your presence. All unauthorized personnel leave the floor. We are missing a lot of senators. Nine are excused. We are looking for Senator Kremer, Senator Lamb, Senator Hefner, Senator Johnson, Senator Peterson. Please begin the roll call.

CLERK: Roll call vote. 18 ayes, 20 nays, 2 present and not voting, 9 excused and not voting. Vote appears on page 1666 of the Legislative Journal.

SENATOR LAMB: The amendment fails. The next amendment please.

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill Mr. President.

SENATOR LAMB: The motion is...Senator Kilgarin.

SENATOR KILGARIN: I move we advance LB 568, machine vote.

SENATOR LAMB: Senator Chambers, for what purpose do you rise.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It is a debatable motion.

SENATOR LAMB: Yes, it is, certainly, debate.
