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that I present the detailed explanation of the bill. Senator Koch, I have reconsidered. Bernice Labedz, just talked me into it. But anyway, so that you can have some idea as to what we are doing, the first conviction, lets take that. Mandatory seven days in jail, \$200 fine, license suspended for six months, that is without probation. The judge can make a decision whether you should have probation or not, discuss it with you. We have to leave the judges something to do. It has not been felt that we can say, "Judges, by golly this is what you are going to do without any variance or leeway." Secondly on first conviction, if probation is granted the conditions of the probations must include license suspension for sixty days. Okay, second conviction. Mandatory thirty days in jail, \$500 fine, license suspended for one year. If you have probation, the conditions of probation must include 48 hours in jail and the license suspended for six months. Third convictions or fourth or fifth, mandatory three months in jail with a six months maximum, \$500 fine, permanent license suspension. Now, if you have probation, conditions of probation must include seven days in jail, one year license suspension. Now that is generally what the bill has. We do not have pretrial diversion in the bill The penalty for driving when a person's license has now. been permanently revoked under the bill, that is a Class IV felony. Up to five years, \$10,000 or both. No minimum. he Director of Motor Vehicles can administratively revoke the drivers license for one year when a person refused to take the blood alcohol content test. Current law allows only six months revocation. That is what is in the bill. Now there are a few other details which I will give to you in written form, probably tomorrow but perhaps day after tomorrow. Senator Newell has asked if there are work permits in the bill, there are not work permits in the bill.

SENATOR LAMB: The motion is the advancement of the bill. Those in support vote yes, those opposed vote no.

CLERK: Senator Lamb voting yes.

SENATOR LAMP: Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Dworak requests a record vote. 29 ayes, 11 nays, and 9 excused and not voting. Vote appears on page 1667 of the Legislative Journal.
