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would agree that it would facilitate the operations of the Department but we have reduced or deferred some of these in other agencies. Unfortunately I think we will have to do it here as well unless Senator Johnson or those who wish to support it could find the appropriate place to cut to make up the same difference. Otherwise, the bill goes out of the Legislature unbalanced. Obviously it will have to be vetoed down.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Von Minden.

SENATOR VON MINDEN: Is the computer system a rental system? Yes. Isn't it a proven fact that with the computers the past year or two, however long they have had them, there has been complications with them and they could have hired people to do it manually and a whole lot cheaper and a whole lot more efficient and better than the computer system? (Interruption).

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: I don't have any personal knowledge to that effect, Senator, Senator VonMinden.

SENATOR VON MINDEN: I thought that perhaps being you worked in the department you would know that.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: No, I don't have any personal knowledge to that effect.

SENATOR VON MINDEN: I believe you could check that out that I am absolutely right.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Johnson, do you wish to close? Senator Newell's light has been on all the time. All right, will you turn your light off then, Senator Newell, please? Senator Johnson, do you wish to close?

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Yes, I do, Mr. Speaker. Senator Warner says this is a magnificent concept if we only had the money but we have the money. We have the money because we have the sales and income tax levying authority and you and I well know that along the way there is going to be a move to increase the sales tax. There is certainly going to be increases to the income tax because the Governor himself has proposed that. So we really have the money. Now as I said at the very outset of this, the reason I am offering this amendment is because three members of the Governor's staff came to me and said this is something that we really ought to have as an administrative tool and they were Larry Bare from the Policy Research Office, John Knight, the Governor's Special Assistant, and
