SENATOR WESELY: Mr. President, considering the magnitude of the issues that Senator DeCamp has brought to us, I think that I would like to move to divide the question into the four different proposals that he has made at this point.

PRESIDENT: Actually, the Chair would rule, if you just want to request a division, I think that all we need to do is request the division and the Chair would rule that that is reasonable.

SENATOR WESELY: Okay.

PRESIDENT: So we will take them up, by way of a vote we will take them up individually.

SENATOR WESELY: All right.

PRESIDENT: Unless you insist that we debate them each individually, I don't...otherwise the debate can go on on any of them and then we can vote on them individually.

SENATOR WESELY: Well I think that we ought to divide the question and to then individually consider each of these rule changes because I think they are significant and should be individually considered.

PRESIDENT: All right. Senator DeCamp, do you wish to respond as to how, procedurally is what we are talking about because we are agreed that they should be divided.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Yes, I agree completely. I would just ask a request if that is acceptable to you, we start at the bottom and work our way up, #4, and go backwards. Is that okay?

SENATOR WESELY: No, I...you present...

SENATOR DeCAMP: Oh, you don't need any prompting, Donald.

SENATOR WESELY: Well, I think you presented them as 1, 2, 3, 4 and we go back to them 1, 2, 3, 4.

SENATOR DeCAMP: I can do it 4, 3, 2, 1 if you want...okay.

PRESIDENT: Okay, let's understand, Senator Wesely, then that we will proceed then with the debate. Do you wish to discuss...? Since you are up, why don't you proceed then?

SENATOR WESELY: Okay. I think that now we are considering item #1 which is a proposed amendment to the rules, again, by Senator DeCamp which deals with the public hearing
