SENATOR NEWELL: I do, Senator.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Does one of those have to do with changing the whole system of setting the tax rates?

SENATOR NEWELL: I have a proposal up there that will allow the Legislature to set the tax rates. That is correct.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Does another one have to do with changing the whole reserve system?

SENATOR NEWELL: It does change the question of reserve but, Senator DeCamp...
