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rules. I am really concerned about suspending the rules here and there just to move things along too quickly. We want to be able to move things quickly and that is what we have done with these other rule changes. Now it is time that we also recognize that we need to balance off that expedition with some effort to try and make sure we don't move too quickly and be allowed to have a little larger majority in order to suspend the rules. So I think it is important at this time to make sure that we proceed in the special session as reasonably as we should to increase what it takes to suspend the rules.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Kahle.

SENATOR KAHLE: Mr. Speaker and members of the body, we spent some time this morning and I think it is well spent in getting the rules set up. Before I talk on the amendment that is now before us I want to echo what Senator Koch said for the record. I won't comment any further on it. I don't believe it would hurt us to have a little tougher process to do the things that we sometimes have to do whether it is three-fifths or two-thirds. There really isn't all that much difference but if you can't get two-thirds of this body to back cloture or whatever you are trying to do, I'm not sure we should do it. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, I think I have as much love for the rules of the Legislature as Senator Beutler only that my love might take a little different course and result in a different end product just as love between two people. They have what they call "S" and "M" I think in the world and that is not considered right by some people but for those who are into that it is as good as M & M, very sweet and enjoyable. But on this particular issue of rules I have to make a couple of comments. If there is, in fact, a love for the rules we ought not even be in this session any longer than is necessary and we ought to follow Senator Koch's suggestion to adjourn until November 13 so that according to the rules by which we should play, the Board of Equalization will assume its proper responsibility for what it did. According to the rules there should not be a deliberate manipulation of figures related to revenue and outgo for the purpose of deceiving the public to gain a political advantage but that rule was violated. The Legislature is everybody's cupcake. Collectively it reflects cowardice and an unwillingness to stand and face hard issues as a body as it should. So what happens is that a few people
