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your principles and you violate that principle by eating your words, you get a type of moral indigestion or you should or maybe what they get is moral constipation. Then when something comes to break the dam, then there is a moral diarrhea and all the integrity and character flow out and is flushed away and you have a shell of an individual available for the use of any special interest group that will pour anything into that shell it chooses. So you make him say, "yea, yea," today and on the same issue you make him say, "nay, nay," tomorrow, then you give him a quote from somebody to justify what he has done. I think what the Legislature has done thus far is shameful but it is clear that I am a minority of one in more than one sense of that expression. But I will continue to do and say what I think is correct and proper for me despite what the rest of the Legislature does. And in closing I will tell you something that I think came from a book called "1984". "There was truth and there was untruth. Though you clung to the truth even against the whole world you were not mad." I hope you will vote for this amendment.

PRESIDENT: The motion before the House is the adoption of the Chambers amendment to the rules. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. The board won't work, Senator Chambers, so we will go to a roll call vote immediately. Proceed with a roll call vote. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. The Clerk will call the roll.

CLERK: (Read roll call vote as found on pages 14-15 of the Legislative Journal.) 17 ayes, 32 nays, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion failed. We are now ready for the... Senator Marsh, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR MARSH: Mr. President, an inquiry please of the presiding officer to ascertain who authorized the delivery of the matches to the desks with the pungent message.

PRESIDENT: I...Mr. Clerk...I don't have any such message or matches of which I have no need for anyway, but... Senator asked for it, Senator Beutler asked that they be distributed. All right, we are ready then, Senator Wesely... Senator Koch, excuse me, I believe you had your light on for a question of the Chair.

SENATOR KOCH: The question of the Chair, Mr. Speaker, is what rules are we operating under at the present time?
