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on the conditions and recommend that they go ahead and do whatever is necessary.

PRESIDENT: Any discussion on the Koch amendment? Senator Lamb, did you wish to discuss the Koch amendment?

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I guess I don't understand the purpose and the intent of Senator Koch's motion. It seems to me that the Appropriations Committee has all the authority they need to study whatever they want to study in regard to the revenue or the spending in this state, and that what he... as I understand what he says, and I only can remember what was read, and we don't have a copy of it, that it seems to me that it is not necessary and that it would serve no useful purpose.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, Senator Koch asked the most important question when he started. He said, what rules are we operating under? And I guess my question is, what rules are we operating under for this particular motion or whatever it is? Is it part of the agenda? What is it?

PRESIDENT: It's just something he has added to the agenda.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Oh.

PRESIDENT: We have got to see if it is instructional to the request of the...the committee chairmen might want to react to that.

SENATOR DeCAMP: I guess I would raise...without trying to be obnoxious, I would raise the point of order.

PRESIDENT: It is instructions to the Appropriations Committee to study which I think the Chairman of the Appropriations Committee might well react to whether or not this is in order.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Has Senator Warner been kind of negligent that we need to give him instructions now?

PRESIDENT: Senator Warner, do you...(interruption).

SENATOR DeCAMP: That's what I'm trying to figure out, what the motion is, and I guess it's instruction.

PRESIDENT: Yes, because the committee already is holding
