CLERK: Mr. President, I have three Attorney General's opinions. I think the one that we have been waiting on is addressed to Senator Warner. If I may, I will read the opinion?

PRESIDENT: Proceed to read the opinion. I would ask everyone to listen because I don't believe we have copies of these yet. So if you will listen carefully, it is not long, is it, Mr. Clerk? Please listen.

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp, we are going to have to have some kind of a motion to address.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Until nine o'clock tomorrow morning.

PRESIDENT: Except for the Speaker who can address himself to this question. Speaker Marvel.

The question is the matter that is going to be on the desk tomorrow on Final Reading, it is in the state in which the Attorney General says you can't do it, if I understood the opinion correctly. So it is whether you want to go ahead and pass that in that state or if you want to do something today to try to stop...do you have a motion?
