tomorrow. First of all, by eight o'clock or at eight o'clock we need a quorum of 25. It doesn't mean the same 25 have to remain but we need at any one time 25. Secondly, we also need on hand 33. We have to pass both bills with 33 votes. So the plan has to do with 25 and then 33 tomorrow and if we don't have a quorum, we don't have 33, then all of this is in vain.

SENATOR CLARK PRESIDING

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Wagner, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR WAGNER: To address the comments that the Speaker just made. Was he talking about starting at eight o'clock?

SENATOR CLARK: Starting at eight o'clock we will have to have a quorum of 25 to open the session. We have to have at least 33 votes to pass the bills.

SENATOR WAGNER: Well I had talked to a number of the senators here earlier and it really would appear that even those that voted green the other day, there was eleven of them, and out of those eleven, nine indicated that they were glad to start Saturday but basically the consensus was to start earlier and I think we could probably start about seven-thirty or fifteen after seven and if he would like I would volunteer to make sure that we have twenty-five senators here to start at that time and...you don't want to...okay.

SENATOR CLARK: We don't care when but we talked it over with several people, Senator Wagner, and eight o'clock seemed to be the consensus that they wanted to start.

SENATOR WAGNER: Okay, fine.

SENATOR CLARK: And we ought to be done and out of here by ten o'clock if everything goes well.

SENATOR WAGNER: All right.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Nichol.

SENATOR NICHOL: I assume that we are going to read #8 first which is the long bill?

SENATOR CLARK: I would assume that too. I haven't seen the agenda. Senator Marvel, do you have #8 first up tomorrow morning?

SENATOR NICHOL: That is the long bill. Okay, fine, thank you.
