placed at each of your desks a small package of Cornnuts. You will find additional ones under each balcony. After all the gloom that we heard on Saturday out at the Center, I thought we ought to have something positive this morning. Bob Boesch, who is the Vice President of Cornnuts was kind enough to send me a large carton of these from Urbana, Ohio. Cornnuts has presently plants at Oakland, California, and at Urbana. He was our speaker at our annual meeting at the Grand Island Industrial Foundation at Grand Island this year, and they have purchased 20 acres of land in Grand Island with an option on 30 more on which to build a plant in Grand Island. They will be building their grain handling facilities this next year in 1983 and building their processing plant in 1984. They will grow approximately 2,500 acres of white corn for this specific purpose this coming year, and finally their goal is to produce 10,000 acres of corn in that area, white corn, which has, of course, an excellent market through the Cornnuts. They will employ from 30 people at the start to 200 people finally. So I am just pleased this morning to tell the Legislature there is at least one positive thing happening in agriculture.

Those are all regarding proposed legislation, Mr. President. They will be inserted in the Journal. I have also received, Mr. President, a series of reports from various state agencies, boards of commissions. They will be referenced in the Journal. I have a report from the Nebraska Commission on Law Enforcement Criminal Justice; a report from the Natural Resources Commission; a report from the Department of Environmental Control; a second report from the Natural Resources Commission; a report from the Department of Roads; several reports from the Department of Roads, Mr. President; a biannual report from the Nebraska Power Review Board; a report from the Nebraska Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education; a report from the Commission on Judicial Qualifications; a report from the Nebraska Energy Office; again, court order reports filed by the Nebraska State Highway Commission; a report from the Crime Victims Reparation Board; a report from the Nebraska Department of Labor; report from the State Ombudsman; report from the Nebraska Department of Revenue. A series of lease agreements, Mr. President, are on file regarding lease arrangements between the Department of Administrative Services for leasing of space by state agencies. Finally, Mr. President, I have a series of audit reports received from the State Auditor. These audits are of the Nebraska Power Review Board, Public Service Commission, the Commission on Aging, Department of Public Welfare, the Nebraska State

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
