

farmer and these various things. The resolution has no specifics. I think if we are going to say something has to be done, we should be specific so we can reach areas of disagreement or agreement. But I guess I could discuss that another time, if at all. I would urge you to adopt these...this amendment if you are going to adopt the resolution.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I'm not certain that I'm going to support the amendment, but I do like the idea of making sure that this is a broadly focused discussion because what we are talking about is a broad issue. It does not concentrate just on agriculture. That is what I realized, after I got back from Washington and nothing added up, that we are dealing with what I call the internationalist movement. I would like to ask Senator DeCamp a question, before he gets too far away, to focus that. Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Well, the old internationalist is here.

SENATOR HARRIS: A few moments ago we were to the point in the discussion where if the soybeans can be grown cheaper in Brazil, if that is where they should be grown in regard to the free market, the system that you are talking about, I call it the internationalist system, and you were talking about how the American farmer could be competitive in food, if anything else. What I am asking you, specifically, now is if the soybeans could be grown cheaper in Brazil, should they be the ones that grow them and we should not grow anything in Nebraska?

SENATOR DECAMP: I think we should do whatever we can compete in. I believe we can compete in all of those things. We will not compete effectively if we keep living in a false world of subsidies.

SENATOR HARRIS: To narrow it again a little bit, if we cannot compete with Brazil, in other words we can't grow the soybeans of the world as cheaply as Brazil or another country, should we give up the thought of growing soybeans in the State of Nebraska?
