

Coliseum including weight exercise rooms, includes the multipurpose court, volleyball competition area, ten racquetball courts on the north end of the fly loft of the Coliseum, renovation of the Coliseum's swimming pool which is currently closed, renovation of six outdoor tennis courts, demolition of an existing storage building and demolition of the men's Physical Education Building which was moved onto the university campus from, following World War II, off the Lincoln Air Force, what was then the Lincoln Air Force Base and it is the facility that is literally falling down. Obviously it was a facility built as a temporary structure some 40 years ago. Phase II would include the football meeting room, the location yet to be determined, four remaining racquetball courts in the Coliseum and a jogging track in the east addition to the Coliseum. Phase III, which is approved as to concept, includes the balance of the facility and that, if it is to have the use of revenue bonds in its construction, of course, would be required of the university at that time to come back to the Legislature, probably not before 1989, it could be later, and which then approval if bonds are to be used, revenue bonds, why, approval would need to be given. The total cost of the facility, if that was done, is estimated at current day prices at \$14.9 million. In terms of the initial debt service, does anticipate an increase in football tickets at a price of \$3.50 for all home, UN-L home football admissions, excluding those that are discounted for individual faculty, students and staff, does not include their families but the individual. It also would provide funds from that \$3.50 for the general payment purpose, cost of construction, financing, repair, maintenance, renovations to campus recreation and athletic facilities and other athletic facilities at UN-L. And as I indicated earlier from that football assessment, \$100,000 would go back to the surplus fund. Approximately 325, \$350,000 would be set aside for general repair and maintenance and the balance would be towards the construction of the various projects. It goes without saying this proposal has had some controversy from its beginning. The first was indicated, the plan for it, back in December as I recall, subsequently was approved by concept on the part of the regents and with instructions to the administration to come to the, or to develop a proposal and then development, a part of that proposal, of course, is the resolution which is before you today. The initial bids which were sent out, and incidentally it is normal practice as a proposal is looked at for the institution to seek bids to get a better, firm decision, a firm estimate as to what costs may be.
