memory serves me correctly, she filibustered on and on, on Select File. She spent a better part of a day, oh, it was towards the last day of the session, consuming valuable time, and if you remember right, those of you who were here, we went on until past eleven o'clock that night to get our business Well, actually, the cloture rule that we are discussing today would have had no impact on what Senator Higgins did, the cloture rule we are debating today, but would have had an impact if you go back to the 1987 session when Senator Chambers had a number of amendments filed to LB 775, you remember. remember those amendments, while actually quite entertaining, talked about having a neon sign in the opening of our Chamber, talked about calling it the Mike Harper Chambers, had exemption for yachts, on down the line. Senator Chambers had a number of amendments, that debate did go over eight hours, and instead of being held hostage by Senator Chambers like we did under that debate on 775, we could have invoked the cloture rule, similar to the one we are debating here this morning. I think it is rather clear why we need it. I hope that the body has the fortitude to remember that, you know, instead of forgetting, like you go to the dentist. Now everybody goes to the dentist and you get your teeth scraped and you say, by golly, am going to get out here, I am going to take good care of my teeth, and not have them do that again. Well, then after about a week, you forget about it and your teeth deteriorate again. Well, that is just like us here today. Every time there comes a situation where we need a cloture rule, we are going to say, by golly, next year I will remember that, we are going to have a rule in place, and so we can't be held hostage like that. like after we get away from the dentist, we come back into We all are feeling good about each other, we are saying, well, nobody is ever going to filibuster like that this year. There is no reason to go through and adopt a cloture rule, and we forget about it, just like we forget about taking care of our teeth after we leave the dentist. Well, I hope that this body today remembers the pain of going to the dentist, does not forget about it, and will eventually adopt this cloture rule today. With that, that serves as my opening.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Chambers, then Senator Haberman.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, I would first like to get a clarification in what the bill does. I think Senator Lynch said there would not be a vote on the amendment that would be pending at the time that cloture would
