PRESIDENT: Thank you. The question is the adoption of the Moore amendment to the amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. This requires 25 votes. Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: Maybe if the members would come back to the body, we wouldn't have to have a call of the house on this one or at least get their vote registered. As I am waiting here, we're getting closer. We're still four short of achieving that without a call of the house.

PRESIDENT: The question is, shall the house go under call? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 9 ayes, 1 nay to go under call, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The house is under call. Will you please return to your seats and record your presence. Call in votes have been authorized.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Pirsch voting yes. Senator Conway voting yes. Senator Goodrich voting yes. Senator Rod Johnson voting no. Senator Peterson voting yes. Senator Beck voting yes. Senator Lamb voting yes. Senator Beyer voting yes.

PRESIDENT: Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 5 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Moore's amendment to the Rules Committee amendment.

PRESIDENT: The Moore amendment is adopted. The call is raised.

CLERK: Mr. President, I now have a second amendment offered by Senator Moore to the amendment offered by the Rules Committee.

PRESIDENT: Senator Moore, please.

SENATOR MOORE: Mr. President and members, the reason this amendment was up there simply was to allow me the opportunity to try and attempt to substitute...do what Senator Schmit did during the debate of 775 and substitute an amendment because I was assuming that Senator Chambers would file 30 amendments and we would be here all day and I was trying to shorten the debate
