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eleventh hour, on regular intervals, is the proper time to put that motion forward. And I think if you would adopt Senator Chambers' amendment, just once a day would you have the chance to muster the votes to silence the person's filibuster and I think that's wrong. I think you should have a chance every hour to really have any teeth, you know. If you adopt this, you basically would allow the person that is speaking at length...I won't...I will stop short of saying harassing the Legislature, you will...if you adopt Senator Chambers' motion, you will allow that person to speak at length on days at a time as opposed to hours at a time. I think the thrust of the cloture rule would allow them to, after eight hours, have a chance to silence them and every hour interval after that I think is the proper time to do it and not every day after that. So I would encourage you to defeat Senator Chambers' amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers, please.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, let me propose a scenario. There is an important bill that a lot of the members support. It gets over to Final Reading and there is a problem. And say I and two or three others don't like the bill, what Senator Moore is giving the impression is that I'm the only one who has done this and that on those occasions when I do it I'm the only one who participates in the discussion. Neither one of those is the correct representation of what has happened. I'm just more persistent and I won't be bullied into submission whereas others will be. But, on Final Reading, I run out the eight hours, so then Senator Moore moves for cloture. The body has not gotten corrected in the bill what needs to be corrected before Final Reading so there is another hour of debate. Then he makes the motion again, another hour of debate, and he makes the motion again. And, by leaving it the way he wants it, the debate can be prolonged an hour at a time, an hour at a time, as long as somebody is willing to discuss it because the rest are not going to vote for cloture because they don't want to vote on the bill in the present form and if they insist on the vote and they vote against the bill, it takes more votes to repass it on Final Reading. So there are difficulties that are created with the rule. I am suggesting that in the same way that other motions can only be made one time on the same day, this one should be made only one time on the same day, and I suggest that you adopt this motion.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers, did you wish to have that be your
