committee did adopt an amendment and that is what we would ask you to adopt at this point to provide for antidiscrimination on the basis of any mental or physical disability in this area. So I would ask for the committee amendments to be adopted, Mr. President.

It is a one-paragraph bill, four lines, and accomplishes only what he suggests, hearing impaired, the blind, the head injury and some others would like to be included ard all of those kinds of needs are unique from the other and require, in their case, individual attention and rehabilitation and maintenance of life kinds of programs. It would make sense. Unless there are any lights on, Mr. Chairman, I would open, ask for your support, and waive closing.
