

SENATOR LAMB: Well Section 10 of the committee amendments then actually becomes Section 12 instead of Section 10? No.

SENATOR WITHEM: Section 10 of the committee amendments becomes Section 10. The existing Section 10 becomes Section 12.

SENATOR LAMB: Then, okay, what about Section 12 in the committee amendments? What does that become?

SENATOR WITHEM: Section 10 becomes Section 11, I'm sorry, Section 12 becomes Section 12 in the bill. Section 10 remains in the bill, renumbered as Section 11.

PRESIDENT: Time.

SENATOR LAMB: I'm still confused, but I don't think there is any point in trying to get straightened out at this point. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Nelson, please, followed by Senator Scofield. We're on the committee amendments.

SENATOR NELSON: I will pass on the committee amendments. I'll speak on the bill later. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: All right, thank you. Senator Scofield, on the committee amendments.

SENATOR SCOFIELD: Thank you, Mr. President. I just have a couple of questions that I don't know if we can even answer at this point, given Senator Withem's comments. But I'm trying to understand one of the amendments that provides for the Option Support Fund, which you mentioned is going to need some additional discussion. Let me just clarify, if my understanding is here, and I was trying to figure out, take for example if you live in, well let's say Douglas County, and say if I want to send my child to Westside, these are old...these are '86-87 numbers, but as I've got it here annual cost per pupil is \$4,782. And if I live in Millard, say and I want to send my child to Westside and the cost there is 2583, so it would save 2,000 versus almost 5,000. As I understand the way this fund would work, if I send my child to Westside, then we as a state...the total fund of dollars that's created as a result of all the various movements that occur across the state, the money would first be drawn out of the fund to make up the difference
