

preceding year, before you can go to a school the next year. So there some...there is a considerable amount of lead time there. But we're going to talk about the dates in just a few minutes. I've got some amendments to the committee amendments dealing with those.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nelson, please, followed by Senator Lamb.

SENATOR NELSON: Mr. Speaker, I had not planned to get into some of the details that Senator Scofield mentioned. But I, too, in general am pretty much in support of the bill. But the financing is a problem with me. I have available in front of me the 1988 figures, a little bit old. But take, for example, a district or subdivision built around a town, Grand Island, south of Grand Island as an example. I'm not stating that the only reason those folks may want to reside in that district, on the south side or formerly the Sully Park district, or a rural district...But I just use the basis of a \$60,000 home. In this Class I district, District 4, their mill levy was \$1.03, 40 cents for Class VI high school, and 62 cents or 63 for the district itself. Using the same scenario, had they...had this same \$60,000 home in Grand Island, of which they could very easily transfer their children then, the school costs alone would be \$1,212, almost exactly doubled. I have a little problem in asking maybe that Class I district to support or to pay into this fund for those residents that are out there maybe chiefly for tax purposes. And that part of the bill I am not satisfied with yet. And I know that there is just no way to put a fiscal note together or what the cost or the transfer would be. And maybe one of those trust me. But until I get that worked out better in my mind I may not be supporting the bill.
