is something that I am seriously considering. And I had an amendment, but it wasn't right, it just didn't fit right with what we wanted to do. But I have had discussions with people about that, and I'm going to continue to have discussion.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: And yet bumping back might be a problem because a person gets bumped back for a few months, then the program opens up again and they come back again, and you could have a transfer back and forth, which would also be a problem.

SENATOR BAACK: Possibly, possibly, but that is something that I think in a wording of an amendment we would try and work out so that it would...so that would be such as a year at a time, or something, so that you didn't have this in and out, in and out kind of situation.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Okay. Thank you, Senator Baack. I do support the amendments. I do support the goal, as a matter of fact. And I'm not trying to pick apart the amendments. I'm hoping that we can, at some point, put these amendments all together and maybe even have a marked up bill on the thing so I can read it and understand what it says...

SENATOR BAACK: Me, too. (Laughter.)

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Yes. I support the delineation at this point, the division. So I appreciate your answers. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Bernard-Stevens, please, followed by Senator Elmer.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Question.

PRESIDENT: Question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. We're voting to cease debate. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, to cease debate.

PRESIDENT: Debate has ceased. Senator Baack, would you like to close on this portion of the amendment.

SENATOR BAACK: Yes, Mr. President and members. I think we've had some good discussion on these amendments and I'm looking
