

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...for me and mine. But I am trying with everything that lies within me to show restraint and try to be a spokesperson for this group who will not, by virtue of the way I present the issue, cause their plight to be any harder than it is already. So we are dealing here with a diluted bill that is a first step. After we take this step, then I would hope that in the future doing good will make us feel so good that we will do even more in the future, but for now I hope you will view this bill in the context of those spiritual and religious values that are supposed to mean something to everybody and not just in terms of so much calcium, metal, wood and whatever other substances these burial goods were made from.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Mr. Clerk, we have some amendments to handle.

CLERK: Mr. President, we do. Senator Chambers, as introducer, you would have the option to take yours up first, Senator. Thank you, Senator. Senator Warner, you had an amendment, Senator, printed on page 727. It's my understanding that you want to withdraw that one, Senator.

PRESIDENT: It is withdrawn.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Warner would move to amend the bill. Senator, I have AM614 in front of me. (Warner amendment appears on pages 925-26 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: Senator Warner, please.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, the amendment which has been passed out this morning is a substitute for the one which was printed in the Journal is the same with one exception. The original amendment also included items beyond which was my intent, and the amendment as it is now before you is more narrow in scope.
