are not yet part of this bill. I don't know if all of them need to be part of the bill, but I definitely share a concern about this is our last chance to deal with this activity. If we take the step of returning back these goods and these skeletal remains, that's a lost opportunity if we don't do it right, that's why I'm still uncertain, still concerned about the language of this bill and though I do plan on voting for its advancement, I also want to make it very clear that it doesn't mean that my vote is secure for the future without understanding the Bernard-Stevens amendment that Chambers amendment dealing with some of these concerns goes and that and alone is not enough in my estimation. I think the dispute resolution of how we handle these matters, one by one, case by case, how we deal with making sure those irreplaceable objects are somehow interred in a way that they can be recovered if needed, all those different concerns are there and still there for myself, and so I know there is sincerity on the part of Senator Chambers and Senator Baack to work these things out. That is why I feel confident seeing the bill go forward, but Senator Warner made good points. concern me. I think they concern all of us and we ought to be able to work this thing through. His amendment I don't think was a solution, but other amendments will have to come forward to solve that problem before some of us feel comfortable with this legislation.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Warner, please, followed by Senator Withem.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, I'm only going to suggest, in my case I'm going to vote no on the advancement, and the reason, if we're sending a message, if that's the line, that there is uneasiness with the bill as it now stands, then send a clear message. And a clear message is that the bill stays on General File and that will be the reason I will be voting no.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Withem, please.

SENATOR WITHEM: I call the question.

PRESIDENT: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 mays to cease debate, Mr. President.
