SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you, sir. Discussion on the amendment? Senator Lamb, followed by Senator Abboud.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. Speaker and members, I have a question of Senator Baack, if he would yield.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Would you respond, Senator Baack?

SENATOR BAACK: Yes, I will.

SENATOR LAMB: I guess it is not specifically on the amendment, but would you explain what the transpor...the current version of the bill does in regard to transportation. Who furnishes the transportation for the option student at this point in his own district and in the district to which he transfers?

SENATOR BAACK: The parents of the student.

SENATOR LAMB: All the way.

SENATOR BAACK: All the way.

SENATOR LAMB: There's no...there's no...there's no requirement of either of the school districts to provide any transportation over to the border of the school district...

SENATOR BAACK: No, sir.

SENATOR LAMB: ...or from the border?

SENATOR BAACK: Not unless there is mutual agreement between the board and the option student.

SENATOR LAMB: There could be a mutual agreement whereby the school district would provide that transportation, is that right?

SENATOR BAACK: Yes, they could.
