I hope that you'll take just a few moments to review the contents of the sack that you have sitting on your desk and, hopefully, you will take time to thank those individuals and those companies that provided something to this sack today and recognize that Nebraska agriculture is very important to our economy. This is just a very brief resolution that honors the men and women in that industry.
