aware that this was brought about by the Supreme Court decision which said that those document; from the other court had to have the seal. And so we are just trying to set up a system here where those courts that either do not have a seal or for some reason do not want to have a seal or for some reason do not put the seal on there as a matter of course, when those documents come to the State of Nebraska, then instead of having to send them back to get them or maybe they won't even do it, then we are having violators that are not being properly assessed their points. I don't think ... I think the striking that sentence is going to strike the guts out of the bill, in my opinion, but you are the lawyer and I am not. But it seems me it has to be self-authenticating or it is of no value.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: I think that if they are self-authenticating, you...

SPEAKER BARRETT: One minute.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: ...could still get them into court. I mean that is what...to me, that is what that phrase could say that is the reason I asked the question. I am not sure what that phrase exactly would mean, but if it says that the convictions will be self-authenticating for any action taken by the director, the director is going to be the one that is going to take the points away, and if they are self-authenticating, then that takes away our objection for admissibility of court that last sentence then really will do away with a lot of the fears that we are going to have. Because we automatically just saying any document we are going to get is going to be admissible into court. As soon as we get it, we are just going to put it right into evidence that mandates evidentiary rulings. The self-authenticating is a presumption unless it can be rebutted some other way. And so I guess I kind of agree with Senator Lindsay in a way that that last sentence just mandates admissibility, and it says it doesn't matter what else happens, that if it is self-authenticating, it is still a presumption ...

SPEAKER BARRETT: Time.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: ...and we can still go with it from that point. Thank you.
