

SENATOR BAACK: We did not want to preclude that from happening. This amendment says that we will be able to display those, because some of the language was...

SENATOR WESELY: Oh, I totally misinterpreted what you are trying to do. I thought you were trying to stop the display.

SENATOR BAACK: I maybe didn't explain it well, but that is what we do, and this amendment changes that and says that you can display those extremely important human remains, especially, and that would more than likely be like prehistoric kinds of remains, that you can do that.

SENATOR WESELY: Okay, I apologize. I didn't follow that very well. Thank you. With that understanding, I would support the amendment. It sounds like it is a clarifying amendment, but I would add, again, with the couple of items that Senator Baack mentioned dealing with the mutual extension of the return of these items, there will be an amendment by, I think Senator Goodrich has some language, I have got some language, to delay the date, and I find the idea that by September of this year that we would have reviewed and returned these items, at least under the bill, without the extension mutually agreed to, to be too quick, and when we talked before about the idea of having an arbitration between two sides and having a bias as to what that decision would be, clearly, if you have a deadline of September of this year, I just can't see the likelihood of extending it by the people requesting these remains. So although I am sure it is an attempt to be reasonable, I still think that we need to, after we move on with other amendments, extend the deadline. I am talking about three more years, maybe that is too long a time, but, certainly, some time beyond September of this year. That is far too quick a time period, and this effort to try and reach mutual agreement I just think won't result in anything. But I do appreciate at least the gesture of recognizing that there is a problem with having these returned so quickly. So at this point, I would accept the amendment, and it is an attempt to clarify some things, and appreciate the effort on the part of Senator Baack to do that.
