SPEAKER BARRETT: Two votes. There is just two parts of the division. We will proceed then to the first part of the divided question. Senator Landis, your light is on, would you care to speak to it? We have one other light, Senator Abboud. Senator Baack, would you care to close then on the first part?

SENATOR BAACK: I would just urge adoption of the first part of the amendment.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. The question then is the adoption of the first part of the divided question, 1 through 5, and 7 and 8, everything except part 6. Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Voting on the first part of the Baack amendment, please vote if you would care to vote. Have you all voted? Please record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the first portion of Senator Baack's amendment.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The first part is adopted. Moving to the second part of the divided question, item 6, Senator Baack, would you care to make a comment?

SENATOR BAACK: Yes, just a brief comment. Section 6 deals with the deadline for the return of the remains, and it says that the deadlines that are in the bill right now, which are one-year from the date of the request, or for the Pawnee tribes, September 10th of 1989 may be extended upon mutual written consent of the two parties, and that is what it does. So I would just defer to Senator Warner and we will go from there.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Before recognizing the next speaker, Senator Pirsch has some guests in the north balcony. We have 20 adults from the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Omaha University Chapter, with their sponsor. Would you people please stand and be recognized by your Legislature. Thank you.
