of those goods will give people time to verify the list, to come to an agreement, rather than at the point of turning them over all of a sudden now we have these goods and any particular conflict that may come out because of that. With particular list, having it 90 days in advance the receiving party would have plenty of time to go through the documentation and verification that these items meet the documentation and the like. That is the first part of the amendment. The second part of the amendment provides a bit of protection then at the point of transfer. What people do then at this point is both entities sign off that the goods that are being received and the goods that were documented to be turned over are such goods, gives both sides a bit of protection that they were under an assumption that there was something in the list that wasn't It's like a...not much more than like a bill of sale, identification that locks in the identity with this particular item with the fact that that was the item that was to be turned over. So by having that list ahead of time for verification and then a transmittal assigning by both parties that what they agreed to was what took place on the point of exchange of the properties would be locked in. So it's more continued clarification and help in that regard. So, with that, I offer this amendment.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: I guess, Senator Conway, I need to ask...I'm not real clear. Senator Baack was explaining it to me a little bit. I'm not real clear, how's this 90 day...what's bind...is there something binding about this? What does it....

SENATOR CONWAY: The 90 days, Senator Warner, is binding in statute. What it basically binds the institution that was holding the burial goods and/or the skeletal remains to do would be to notify 90 days in advance to the receiving entity that here is a list of...

SENATOR WARNER: I appreciate the legal terms, but if you'd get away from receiving, transferer and transferee and talk like farmer talk, it would help me a lot, please.

SENATOR CONWAY: Okay. In the case at hand we have the Historical Society and we have the Indian tribe that...

SENATOR WARNER: Okay.
