SENATOR WARNER: I mean initially it sounds like it's trying to be helpful, Senator Conway. But it seems to me that this is creating another area of conflict, or not?

SENATOR CONWAY: I don't believe so. I think what it is is it's nothing more than what you're going to do at the date you're to do it. It's to give 90 day notification ahead of time of what it is we're going to do so that they'll have 90 days to review that and possibly make sure or to verify that list, and they will know what it is they are going to be receiving at the date of transmittal. Up to that point they may not have any idea what it is they are going to get. They made a request and then you have that date of transmittal. Rather than having that be the fulcrum point, they would have a document ahead of time knowing what it is you're going to get, and it is helpful.

SENATOR WARNER: I would like to...yes, it is. I was just sitting here trying to rationalize. I assume a group could come in and would ask for...you ask for all burial goods and skeletal remains that the museum is holding that the museum believes is subject to return.

SENATOR CONWAY: Under 340 you do that, yes.

SENATOR WARNER: Right.

SENATOR CONWAY: This simply clarifies it and says 90 days before you do that, tell them what it is that you're going to be...what you're holding that you're going to be giving them at the date of transmittal.

SENATOR LANDIS PRESIDING

SENATOR LANDIS: One minute.

SENATOR CONWAY: That would give them an opportunity to look at that list and refute that and say we don't believe everything is here, have you looked completely, there are things here on this list that you are going to be giving us that we don't believe even belong to us, that we don't...you've got a negotiating period of 90 days to review what it is you're going to receive.
