So we're just picking up the event that if a relative is known but refuses to pay we can still get the job done with the county paying the bill. I would move those four amendments, those four points in the form of an amendment.

SENATOR LANDIS: Three minutes remain, Senator Goodrich.

SENATOR GOODRICH: That's all I've got. Wait just a second. No, that's all I've got.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Senator Goodrich. There is...there are two lights on, Senator Schmit and Senator Chambers, and I believe the Clerk has an amendment. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would move to strike what was original Section 7 of the Goodrich amendment. It's the part that reads, Senator, just so I'm clear, (Read Chambers amendment as found on pages 1327-28 of the Journal.)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right, and so that you...

SENATOR LANDIS: Senator Chambers is called on.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature. The words that I am going to leave in the bill that Senator Goodrich would strike "or equipment used in the violation". Senator Goodrich wants to strike that and if the violation could occur, as he mentioned, I would agree. Senator Goodrich had mentioned if there is a construction project and they inadvertently or accidentally unearth these remains, they could forfeit their equipment. No, we're not talking about that. We allow for that kind of thing, these public projects and so forth. What we are talking about in this section is an intentional violation of the act. If you look on page 8, in line 12, but let me start reading in line 10, because we're dealing with Section 10, "Any person, Indian tribe or Indian tribal member shall have a civil cause of action against any person alleged to have intentionally violated the Unmarked Human Burial Sites and Skeletal Remains Protection Act." Then when we get over to the other page you're talking about the kind of relief that the court can grant. There still are what are
