in fact, Senator Chambers said it well I think, when the Pawnees asked the Historical Society for all the information pertinent to particular areas and the Historical Society then gave that to the Pawnee, they went through those records with their people, with their archeologists and what have you and they found approximately 1,054 items that felt would be returned. Later on the Historical Society and other people were saying, no, no, there was more than 9,000 of it. Well, either the Historical Society is wrong (a); (b) the Pawnee weren't very good in deciding what they wanted to return; or (c) the Historical Society did not give up all the information. You know, I would prefer that really none of those be the proper thing, that maybe they are all somewhat right in what they are trying to do. But what was occurring to me is that we are going to need some type of mechanism to go through these things. I know Senator Warner asked, you know, or I think Senator Warner asked, maybe it was someone else that asked, how many disputes are we going to have, and I don't think anyone in here knows that. But I think we all agree that we do need some type of conflict resolution some way to work through that and I think once we get it into law, heads will cool down, people will realize that this is going to happen, they can agree upon third parties, it will start to work and we will have something in place that can solve these particular problems without again bringing it to the Legislature. With that, I move and hope the body would adopt the amendment proposed in front of us at this time. Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The question is the adoption of the amendment offered by Senator Bernard-Stevens and others. Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record please.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 1 may, Mr. President, on the adoption of the Bernard-Stevens, et al, amendment.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Warner would move to amend the amendment just adopted, AM1064, in Section 11, Line 1, page 3, by adding, "Except such remains and goods, the disposition of which is disputed and subject to arbitration."

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Again, Mr. President, this may not be precisely drafted and someone may correct it, but as I understand the
