problems, obviously did not assess the problems as they are known since the last month and I don't know if there is a level of liability on that incorrect appraisal, at least at that what has now become obvious, was incorrect. If there is a level of legal liability there or not, I don't know. I do know, understood from the public hearing from a legal counsel representing the university that there was two statutes that ...

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR WARNER: ... are on the books now that cover this kind of area and had the Supreme Court chose a different section than they did choose to apply, why, the statute of limitations or a repose, whichever, would not have ran out but because of the one that was selected which, incidentally, probably is something that ought to be looked at in the ... for future legislation, that there shouldn't be two statutes that either of which might applicable to this kind of a situation and have different date sequences in them, that might be another area that we ought to explore for change in the future. I'm sorry, you asked three questions, Loran, as we went along. I'm trying to remember but I assume if there are further questions or I didn't touch on everything as thoroughly as you meant, others on the committee can or if you'd reask them, I'd appreciate it.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Haberman, you're next, but may I introduce some guests first of Senator Smith. In the north balcony we have 16 fourth through sixth graders from Hanover, Nebraska, with their teacher. Would you folks please stand and be recognized. Thank you for visiting us today. Haberman, please.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the body, I'm going to mention an amendment I'd like to put on this bill and I'm going to tell you about it so I could get some feedback from my fellow senators. Here a few years ago, if my memory serves me correct, we were going to close the School of Pharmacy here The facts and figures were shown to us that time that we did not need two pharmacy colleges and it worked out that somebody decided that we could afford two pharmacy colleges so we have two. So now that we're about to spend roughly \$3 million to help one of those pharmacy schools or colleges, quite possibly we should take that \$3 million and enhance the school here in Lincoln and close the one in Omaha?
