PRESIDENT: Time.

SENATOR GOODRICH: I would like, just in summary, I would like to suggest that we do not adopt the Schmit amendment, we do not adopt the Moore amendment, we just advance the bill to Select File and I will invite anybody that wants to participate to come into a meeting and have the university people there to answer these kind of questions direct from the university people and the architects, the Daly Company, and whoever else you want there. I'd be happy to answer any and all question you might have. I would suggest we not adopt the two amendments, but we proceed with the correctives of the building.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Wehrbein, please, followed by Senator Korshoj.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Mr. President, members, I rise to strongly oppose, reluctantly oppose the Schmit amendment. I understand all the frustrations that are expressed in this body about this. In fact, I assume and assure you that every option that has been...or every frustration that has been expressed in here was expressed in the Appropriations Committee, perhaps even a little more strongly worded than this as we faced the issue of this kind of amount of money. But the fact of the matter is, I don't think that we have much choice if we really want to look at the good of the school and the good of the University of Nebraska and the good of the state over the long run. Prolonging this, fixing up a building is only going to prolong the agony and actually run into much, much, much more expense. We have ongoing college classes there. There's 200 approximately in the College of Pharmacy. By the way, Senator Haberman, I'd like to answer your question. There is only one University of Nebraska College of Pharmacy. That is at the med center at Omaha. There is none in Lincoln. The only other one in the state is the Creighton School of Pharmacy. But if we look back and examine all the things that have been done, we have to acknowledge that actually all of the objections and all of the misunderstandings or the faults have been gone through the court, have gone all the way to the Supreme Court of Nebraska and they have stated
