and there is a very intense, in-depth, broad-based research effort as evidenced by the letter that Senator Warner sent around and I think if you'd dig into that further, we'd find that there are a lot of grants connected with medicine coming into that college and it probably would be a mistake to be going beyond that today.

SENATOR NELSON: Probably would hinder our then, University Hospital and so on, I suppose, right?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I would assume that, at least to some degree.

SENATOR NELSON: Thank you.

Senator Morrissey, please, followed by Senator PRESIDENT: Smith.

Mr. President and members, just a couple SENATOR MORRISSEY: points. I'm not going to support Senator Schmit's amendment but I'm real glad that he brought it to the attention of the body and this whole problem because this is a good history lesson for the people of this state. You look at the liability, there is liability now because the statutes of limitation has run out because of professional negligence. This was supposedly award-winning building, state of the art construction, should have been inspectors inspecting it daily and yet now we're talking about cracks in the concrete. Maybe it will last 30 or 40 years if we put another two to \$3 million in it. submit to the body that to remember, this is a good lesson in history. It's going to cost us \$3 million for this lesson and should this body consider building another concrete building in the near future that's going to have to last 30 to 40 years or maybe 100 to 500 years, you think about the College of Pharmacy in Omaha, state of the art design, cracks in the concrete and inspectors crawling all over the building and a question of liability. Just think about that later in the session. you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Smith, please.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, I would like to continue to pursue the who. I asked that question as I was just going off and I don't think this is something, I know that people probably don't ... a lot of people probably don't want to hear all this, but I think we need to publicly discuss this.
