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commission to conduct a comprehensive study, while Senator Warner's amendment appears to jump to the conclusion and the fruition of the first part. So I would rule that it is not germane. Senator Warner, did you wish to accept the decision of the Chair, or challenge it, or what?

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, in view of the clock and in view of, I suspect, the attendance because, obviously, I would move to suspend the rule, but it would not look, at the moment, that at this point I may wish to reinstate the amendment after lunch, or at a later point. But, at this point, I would temporarily withdraw it, if I may do that.

PRESIDENT: You wish to withdraw it at this time?

SENATOR WARNER: Yes.

PRESIDENT: All right, that would be fine. All right. Mr. Speaker, may I ask your advice, please, on continuing from here. Would you rather have recess at this time? Senator Moore's amendment is up next, and I don't see him at the moment. What would be your suggestion?

SPEAKER BARRETT: Mr. President, I would suggest that if there are matters for the record, they be handled at this point, and we recess for lunch.

PRESIDENT: All right. Mr. Clerk, do you have anything for the record?

SPEAKER BARRETT: Excuse me, Mr. President. Excuse me just a moment, please.

PRESIDENT: Yes.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Mr. Clerk, may I ask whose is the next amendment?

CLERK: Mr. Speaker, Senator Moore...

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Moore.

CLERK: ...Senator Moore has an amendment pending, followed by an amendment from Senator Scofield.
