

study it, let's study it. You know, sometimes if you can't find any other reason to be against a bill, you either study it or blame it on the lobby and those just aren't valid reasons right now. And the main thing that I guess I want to talk to Senator Moore about a little bit is the reason to vote on this bill and adopt this amendment isn't because of the Attorney General's Opinion. That adds the urgency. And it looks like Senator Chambers has brought his new-found friend with him. I...well, it helps the debate, Senator Chambers. I enjoy that. The Attorney General's Opinion is the urgency, it's not the reason. It's not the reason to vote for any bill if we want to go out and just challenge a court case. But that adds the reason to do it now because you have heard the argument, let's don't do it now, let's don't do it now, let's study, study, study and find out what happens. Quite frankly, if you study, study, study, you are going to be, in essence, agreeing with the Attorney General and saying you are going to need a vote of the people. Can you imagine what that constitutional amendment might look like and the mess that we might have? Look at some of the things we have had with the right to bear arms, Initiative 300, whether you are for or against those amendments. Look at the type of quality of constitutional amendments we have had. It could open up a Pandora's Box to no end and it can tie our hands forever. We don't want to do that. And we need to take a stand and this is our vehicle to do it. No, that's not the reason to vote for the amendment in and of itself. That's the reason to vote for it now. But the substance of the amendment is what you need to look at, the fact that Kearney is a university and has been operating that way and no matter what we do in this body it's going to continue on its path with Master's programs and available programs to everyone of the counties, everyone of you that have students in Kearney right now. And that's the reason we want to go ahead and make Kearney part of the university's system, along with Senator Withem's study bill and to study how we're going to do that so we don't have that internal fight of the institutions. This isn't a turf war, Senator Wesely, at all. In fact, this is a very, very good example of how most of the state would like to come together and place their institutions in one body. You know, we could be out there saying, yeah, we want to be a competing university and we want to take all those dollars out of Lincoln. That's not at all, you know, that's not what this issue is about. I think the faculty senate in Omaha with UN-O has seen this and they endorse this concept. You know, there are some reasons for Kearney to be worried. They initially were concerned that, hey, what
