If and when this happens, and that governance is under the Board of Regents, who is going to guarantee that that university at Kearney will stick to what the Regents tell them to do? They are not sticking to their role and mission now and I think we should be guaranteed that that will happen or has someone told them already, if we get you into the university, you will be able to give any degree you want? See, I really... I am very concerned about that because I think we can have only one university system and you can't dilute the degree system all the way across the state. Mr. Speaker, do I have some money... some money (laughter), I'm still thinking in lira. Do I have some time left? Do I have some time left?
