SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Lynch, please.

SENATOR LYNCH: ...and I'm not sure what the questions were that Senator Wehrbein asked. But are you referring to, when you talk about farm subsidies, are you referring to conservation reserve, the soil conservation programs, the drought relief programs? Is this part of what you're referring to?

SENATOR LYNCH: Well if you own land you can get relief in a number of different ways. Whatever way it is you get relief you still own the land and benefit from that relief. You profit from a property tax point of view, I guess. The comparison would be, for example, if you owned a lot of apartments, and you were renting apartments out. You have no programs of relief from the federal government for not allowing some of your rental units, for example, to be rented. I'm not sure how far you want to go. But there are a number of people, Cap, who at the present time have no access to relief at all. It seems that in LB 84 those who have no access to relief at all now receive a very small proportion of this property tax bill, and it's going, unfortunately, to a lot of people who have already received an awful lot of relief, just because they happen to own land and property and can...probably are not in nearly as need of it as others who have no relief at all.

SENATOR DIERKS: Well you've come up with an A bill that...Stay there, Daniel. You've come up with an A bill that is different than the one...or a fiscal note, or whatever it is, different from the original fiscal note. So you evidently have some figures that refer to where these losses might...or these gains might be made.

SENATOR LYNCH: Sure, want me to share those with you?

SENATOR DIERKS: What's that?
