record your presence. Senator Lynch, would you record your presence, please. Thanks. We are looking for Senator McFarland and Senator Wesely. We are voting on the adoption of the Schmit amendment and he has authorized call in votes.

CLERK: Senator Labedz voting yes. Senator Baack voting yes. Senator Barrett voting yes. Senator Warner voting yes.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kristensen has requested a roll call vote. Senator Schmit, do you want to go ahead? We are missing Senator Wesely only. Okay, we will have a roll call vote and the question is the adoption of the Schmit amendment. Mr. Clerk. Okay, reverse order has been requested. That is granted.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See pages 1734-35 of the Legislative Journal.) 25 ayes, 15 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted. Do you have anything further on it?

CLERK: Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The call is raised.

CLERK: Senator Morrissey would move to amend the bill, Mr. President. Senator, I have your AM1380. It on page 1693 of the Journal.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Morrissey, please.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Yes, Mr. Speaker, members, thank you. This is the same amendment we started talking about originally around one forty-five, if you can remember that far back. I hope you are all still with us. It still is a very important issue and it has to do with local control. Those of you that just voted against local control on that last amendment, maybe you can mend your ways and address local control on this amendment. We are talking about trust here. The issue is, who do you trust? Do you trust the people that have gone along all along and said, don't worry, everything will be done correctly, and if it is not, we will handle it, just don't worry? Or do you trust the people that live in the communities to make their own decisions, to do their own monitoring because they have no large financial stake in this process?
